SUBSCRIPTION BOUND: BEING THE DISTRICT PROVIDES TO STUDENTS THAT IT IS NOT REQUIRED TO, FOR A FEE.

Dr. Varkey is questioned about a transportation study and whether or not the BHPO contributed to the reconfiguration of our schools, she claims that the BHPO did not contribute to her claims.

An appeal of this decision in court of law, COTEST Buses provided to students at the Early Childhood Center was taken away.

The District took a firm stance that there were NO HAZARDOUS ROADS.

As a result of the reconfiguration and realignment, parents were offered a subscription bus pass for their student, a reduction rate of \$100 for the first year only.

UCOTS busing was severely curtailed.

Subscription busing routes to MMN, and CMS were canceled.

Ms. Khanna, Ms. Alvin, and Dr. Forreger & NJ21ST Contributors attended meetings, attempted to inform the District through public comments and emails, and published articles expressing their concerns.

The Board of Education did not object, nor did the Mayor or any of the Town Council Members that were currently serving.

No one from the PTO showed up to a public meeting to object.

BOE Member Council did not take the child safety issue to social media.

Weeks before the 2023-24 school year, students who received Courting busing at CMS, MMN, and MHP were told there was no more busing.

No students who received courting free non-mandatory busing were affected.

Multiple parents and NJ21ST Contributors write to the District and obtain responses that are either vague or do not directly answer any of the questions families have.

Board member Stirling and the Business Administration team, who are the majority of students who receive Courting busing in 2023.

However, the total number reported to the Department of Education was 337.

Four members Forreger, and two additional parents from the community, write to the inquiry about parents having to pay for busing while others receive free mandatory busing.

Through elected officials and paid district employees, the community learns that no one knows how many students are receiving free, mandatory busing and that NO CRITERIA FOR FREE BUSING EXISTS.

Dr. Forreger suggests charging everyone a reduced fare for mandatory busing to eliminate the inquiry.

A controversial transportation survey is administered to students without parental notification or consent.

A NJ21st contributor informs the public of this ethical and legal violation. As a result, Feiss is removed from his position and the newly-hired new leadership running our PTO is headed by NJ21ST Contributor.

Board member Bradford requests a "revisit" at courting busing as an additional revenue source.

The Board of Education, along with the Transportation Consultants the NEW BOB would have no hand in setting.

Finance Committee Meeting Minutes reflect the Transportation Policy of "No Hazardous Roads" with a plan under the Peter Stirling/Council BOE to "make changes" to the policy.

The Board of Education did not object, nor did the Mayor or any of the Town Council Members that were currently serving.

No one from the PTO showed up to a public meeting to object.

BOE Member Council did not take the child safety issue to social media.

Dr. Varkey sends her resignation letter the day after Christmas.

Ms. Khanna sounds the alarm, again, on the highly problematic trajectory of the District's transportation approach.

A resident who filed suit against the HUOE to get information regarding the Transportation database wins...he is in to get the information.

Concerns are raised about the lack of mapping with the townscape, BHPO and using a rubric to "score" every road in town, but neither the residents nor the Board of Education provide or provided to the whole Board.

The policy does not mandate anything - only the roads the Board could decide to like for free.

Again interests or reasoning for the roads listed after \$30,000 worth of consultant work.

The acting Superintendent provides the Board with three options for busing.

The majority vote to cancel courting busing and only offer subscription busing for those who aren't state mandated to receive busing.

PTO Officer, Political Machine operates, and other political operatives, who are asked about the transportation decision after being shown the results of the year's preparation for the coming election.

These special interests deliberately misinterpret NJ21st's position in public and on "conservative" Facebook pages.

A video involving multiple PTO officers and BOE candidate Terence during his role as BH PTO President, is released on YouTube, despite her attempt to having another PTO Officer removed for sharing an opinion she disagreed with. Terence is advanced when she took on the role of PTO President.

The BOE President, Mr. Terence, makes comments on how scared she was watching it.

Board member Stirling calls the transportation policy "ridiculous."

Through COTEST, the Board of Education has the townscape and BHPO were never consulted or provided collaborative insight into the transportation decision developed by Stirling and supported by Terence.

Town Councilwoman Bill, who never once attended a meeting on this issue for the majority of the year, goes door-to-door asking residents to sign a petition.

She is now managing the campaign page for "Buses for BH."

Ms. Alvin and NJ21st both suggested Universal Busing achievable within our School Budget.

None of the political operatives, no one from Ms. Terence's PTO group, nor one representative from the local government supported this suggestion.

The new majority includes Dr. Forreger, Ms. Khanna, Ms. Joly, and Ms. Alvin, voted to approve a budget proposal to generate over \$500 student with a \$750 Family cap - one of the most expensive universal busing programs services in the area.

The acting Superintendent reports that every single student in the district that receives subscription busing was provided a seat.

With a new majority in place, Dr. Forreger, Ms. Khanna, Ms. Alvin, and Ms. Joly, the District made the decision to end all its transportation services.

All families are provided with an affordable transportation service, and the public gets to be the judge of whether a route is hazardous.

Transportation services are inherently more stable and Financial liability is reduced as funding utilization rates are more predictable.
